PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As members who support Scouting through the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians (IFSR), here are a few ideas to strengthen the connection between Rotary and Scouting worldwide.

Recognize Rotary's Role in Scouting: In my district (5320), 12 Rotary clubs charter 30 Scout units. Local Scout councils have recognized these Rotary clubs at Rotary Presidents' meetings. This type of recognition highlights the strong partnership between our organizations and encourages continued support.

Increase Visibility Through Joint Events: Our district also hosted a Rotary–Scouting booth at a Scout leader training event. This created opportunities to connect with potential Rotarians, future IFSR members, and leaders interested in service. Encourage Collaboration: Rotary clubs can look for ways to work with both coed and girls-only Scout councils. Joint service projects involving Scouts, Interact clubs, Rotaractors, and community groups can strengthen relationships and expand our impact.

Ideas for Joint Service Projects

Service Club Day: A “Hearts and Hands” event bringing together families and multiple organizations to complete service projects at a single location.

World Coastal Cleanup Day: Held on the third Saturday of September, offering opportunities for coordinated service at locations around the globe.

As always, IFSR supports youth as they prepare for their future and work toward building a more peaceful world for all.

Rotary Supporting the Next Generation: Girl Scouts and Girl Guides

When organizations work together to mentor and empower young leaders, the entire community grows stronger."

Joie S. Hain, DBA, submitted this report.

Organizations like Rotary International and the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts share a common mission:

developing ethical leaders who serve their communities. By working together, Rotary clubs can play a meaningful role in supporting youth leadership and service.

One of the most impactful ways Rotarians can help is through mentorship. By serving as guest speakers, career mentors, or advisors for leadership projects—such as the Girl Scout Gold Award—Rotarians help young women build confidence, leadership skills, and civic awareness.



Rotary clubs can also partner with local troops on service projects such as environmental cleanups, food drives, literacy campaigns, or community gardens. These collaborations bring Rotary's motto, *Service Above Self*, to life while showing youth the impact of community service.

Support can also include sponsoring troop activities, leadership camps, or providing small grants for youth-led projects. Scholarships and recognition programs further encourage leadership and service.

Rotarians may also share their expertise through workshops on topics such as public speaking, financial literacy, entrepreneurship, and digital citizenship—skills that prepare young leaders for the future.

Finally, Rotary provides a pathway for continued involvement through programs like Interact and Rota-ract, helping inspire a lifelong commitment to service.

Building an Effective IFSR District Committee



The first step in building an IFSR District Committee is to identify who we currently serve and who we want to serve. In our case, the Scouting Association service area aligns closely with Rotary Districts 6950 and 6890.

The second step is to meet with the Scouting Association to discuss forming a joint Scouting–Rotary district committee.

The third step is a planning meeting with the Scouting Association leadership to define goals, expectations, and areas of collaboration.

The fourth step is to recruit Rotary members to the committee. We began with a list of IFSR members, provided by Randy Seefeldt, IFSR Executive Secretary. As Coordinator, I reached out to these members, all of whom joined the committee. We are now expanding by identifying Rotarians who were involved in Scouting. We have already added a new Scouting Rotarian who attended our most recent meeting, and we are in discussions with additional community leaders to join. We are also working to place Rotary representatives on local Scouting Association subcommittees within the service area. To date, two Rotary members have been elected to these local committees.

The fifth step is to establish goals for the coming year. Our 2026 goals include:

- Meeting with Rotary clubs to help start new Scouting units
- Promoting the Cliff Dochterman Award (neither district had presented one in recent years; the first was awarded last month, with three additional nominations underway)
- Encouraging Scouters who are Rotarians to join IFSR

Promoting other IFSR awards and recognitions

Travis Emery, Scouting Association Professional Director, shared this perspective:

“Building the committee from a professional Scouter’s perspective, it was helpful to have someone engage with the local Scouting Association and ask to be part of the effort. Sharing goals and expectations created opportunities to strengthen the partnership between Scouting and Rotary.”

This experience confirms that strong collaboration between the Scouting Association and Rotary districts is the most effective way to build a successful IFSR program.

It will be held from July 30 to August 8, 2027, on Sobieszewo Island in Gdańsk. This is the first time the World Scout Jamboree will be held in Central Europe, celebrating 120 years of the movement. IFSR Granted Consultative Status with World Scouting



On March 31, 2026, we received the exciting news that the International Fellowship of Scouting Rotarians (IFSR) has been granted Consultative Status by the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WOSM), now commonly referred to as *World Scouting*. This allows IFSR the ability to create a lasting partnership with WOSM. We join eight other organizations with Consultative status. This should make it easier to participate in regional conferences, the World Scout meeting, and the World Jamboree.

Thank you to Steve Kent, an IFSR member from the Waterford Valley Club in Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada. Steve sits on the World Scout Committee and was able to help shepherd our application through.

WOSM is an independent, worldwide, non-profit, and non-partisan organization that serves the global Scout Movement. Its purpose is to promote unity and understanding of Scouting's principles while supporting its growth and development. WOSM is a confederation of more than 170 National Scout Organizations, representing over 50 million members worldwide.

A number of Scouting-related organizations hold Consultative Status with the World Scout Committee. These organizations strengthen Scouting's mission by providing complementary support in areas beyond World Scouting's core functions. Consultative Status is reviewed every three years at the second meeting of the Committee following a World Scout Conference.

North Dakota: Bismarck Rotary Club hosts the Scouts Report to the Governor



The Bismarck Rotary Club was proud to again host the Scouts Report to the Governor. This has been an annual tradition of the club almost since its beginning, with this year marking the 101st Scouts Report. The Northern Lights Council of the Boy Scouts of America covers the entire state of North Dakota, 18 counties in northwest Minnesota, and 2 counties each in Montana and South Dakota.

Tim Tello, Council President (and former member of the Bismarck Rotary Club), gave recognition and thanks to Scout leaders and past and current Scouts. Scouting officials say there are 1,428 youth Scouts ages 11-18 in the Northern Lights Council. Over 6,000 nights stayed at camp, and 108 earned Eagle Scout Awards. Scouts have provided 40,000 hours of service projects for youth and adults.

North Dakota Governor Doug Burgum attended the meeting, spoke about his own experiences as a Boy Scout, and recognized the Scouts for making a positive and impactful difference in North Dakota. He also thanked the parents and leaders present for their commitment to the Scouting effort and their children.

He came up with the idea of giving them backpacks with items that the victims can have for comfort, hygiene — something that they can actually call theirs, since they have gone from nothing, and now they can have something that goes with them.

He presented his idea to the Rotary Club in Bentonville, and they gave me a very gracious donation, and he was given a couple of private donations as well.

With community support, he was able to stuff more than 1,000 backpacks. All of the hygiene products were bought with donation money from the Rotary Club.

Utah: Scout Rebuilds Fishing Dock After Fire



Scouting and Rotary came together in a meaningful way to help restore a beloved community resource at Pine Valley Reservoir. A seventeen-year-old Eagle Scout candidate is leading a project to rebuild the fishing dock, which was damaged during a wildfire last year.

The project is deeply personal. Having grown up fishing at Pine Valley with his family, he was concerned the area might never recover after the fire. His family has long-standing ties to the land, and a tradition of service—his older brother recently completed his own Eagle Scout project in the same area, and multiple family members have earned the Eagle Scout rank.

This project has been made possible through strong community collaboration. The Dixie National Forest Service has provided guidance on materials and planning, while the St. George Rotary Club, along with local donors, has helped fund the approximately \$10,000 effort. When completed, the new dock will once again provide a place for families to gather, fish, and enjoy the outdoors for generations to come.

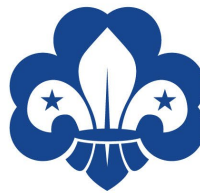
